- 2. Household cleaning products
- 3. Analgesics (pain relievers)
- 4. Foreign bodies
- 5. Topical medicines (for the skin)
- 6. Vitamins
- 7. Cold and cough medicines
- 8. Plants
- 9. Heart medicines
- 10. Pesticides

Most common exposures, children 6-19 years:

- 1. Analgesics (pain relievers)
- 2. Cold and cough medicines
- 3. Foreign bodies
- 4. (tie) Food products/food poisoning Plants
- 6. Bites and stings
- 7. Antihistamines
- 8. (tie) Cosmetics and personal care products Sleep medicines and antipsychotics Stimulants and street drugs

Most common exposures, adults 20 years and older:

- 1. Analgesics
- 2. Sleep medicines and antipsychotics
- 3. (tie) Antidepressants

Alcohols

- 5. Muscle Relaxants
- 6. Household cleaning products
- 7. Cosmetics and personal care products
- 8. Anticonvulsants
- 9. Heart medicines
- 10. Fumes, gases or vapors
