- 5. Arts, crafts, office supplies

Most common exposures, children 13-19 years:

- 1. Analgesics (pain relievers)
- 2. Sedatives and antipsychotics
- 3. Stimulants and street drugs
- 4. Antihistamines
- 5. Cold and cough medicines

Most common exposures, adults 20-59 years:

- 1. Sedatives and antipsychotics
- 2. Analgesics (pain relievers)
- 3. Alcohols
- 4. Household cleaning products
- 5. Heart medicines

Most common exposures, adults 60 years and older:

- 1. Heart medicines
- 2. Analgesics (pain relievers)
- 3. Sedatives and antipsychotics
- 4. Hormones (including antidiabetic and thyroid medicines)
- 5. Cosmetics and personal care products
