- 4. (tie) Antimicrobials Pesticides
- 5. Topical medicines (for the skin)
- 6. (*tie*) Foreign bodies
  Sleep medicines and antipsychotics

#### Most common exposures, children 6-19 years:

- 1. Analgesics (pain relievers)
- 2. Sleep medicines and antipsychotics
- 3. (tie) Antihistamines

## Most common exposures, adults 20 years and older:

- 1. Analgesics (pain relievers)
- 2. Sleep medicines and antipsychotics
- 3. Antidepressants
- 4. Hormones
- 5. (tie) Alcohols
